Fellow Redeemed.

As we stand at the threshold of a new year, the days ahead brim with possibility. It's a season when many of us resolve to prioritize what matters most — health, family, and purpose. But as members of the Body of Christ. there is one priority that anchors all others: being present in worship and community.

Church attendance is more than a routine or obligation; it is a tangible expression of our faith and a vital part of our spiritual growth. Hebrews 10:24-25 reminds us:

"Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another - and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

Worship is where we gather to experience the presence of God, be nourished by His Word, and grow in unity as His people. When we make worship a priority, we declare that Christ is at the center of our lives, and we open ourselves to His transformative power.

Here are three reminders as we enter 2025:

1. God Meets Us in Worship

The psalmist writes. "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord!" (Psalm 122:1). Something profound happens when we gather as a church. God meets us through prayer, Scripture, music, and the Sacraments. It is in worship that our hearts are reminded of His love, His promises, and His faithfulness.

When we are physically present in worship, God speaks into our lives and shapes us for the days ahead.

2. Our Presence Encourages Others

Faith is not a solo journey. When we show up, we encourage one another simply by being there. A full sanctuary is a visible testimony of faith and hope. Someone struggling may see you worshiping and be reminded that God is still at work. When we sing, pray, and take Communion side by side, we proclaim that Christ is alive and that we are united in Him.



MUSIC MINISTRY

CHOIR & HANDBELLS FOR YOUTH & ADULTS
BY JACOB DRENGLER

The Psalms, which Lutheran pastor and church musician Paul Westermeyer refers to as "the womb of church music," have provided inspiration for hymnwriters and composers of many denominational traditions throughout the history of the Church. The Psalter has historically been of particular importance in the Lutheran tradition, beginning with Martin Luther, who referred to the book of Psalms as "a little Bible," which offers God's people a summary of the whole story of salvation in one little book. Last month, we began to delve into the history of the use of the Psalms in Lutheran worship, with a particular emphasis on Reformation-era Lutheran hymnody based on the Psalms. This month, we will explore that topic in greater detail, examining the musical genres employed in psalmody by Martin Luther and his contemporaries and concluding with a brief discussion of Lutheran psalmody in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries.

The musical presentation of psalmody in the nascent Lutheran Church took two primary forms, both of which are still widely practiced by Lutheran congregations in the twenty-first century. The first, which speaks to the continuity of many worship practices of the Lutheran Church with those of the Roman Catholic Church, is the singing of the Psalms in their original poetic prose to chant tones. Beginning in 1529, many Lutheran hymnals began to introduce harmonized versions of the traditional Gregorian Psalm tones. While the Psalms were now often chanted in German rather than the Latin of the Roman Catholic rite, particularly at the level of the local parish church, the unmetered form of the existing Psalm tones, as well as newly composed chants devised within a similar stylistic framework, allowed for their use with new German translations of the Psalms. We continue to use Psalm tones inspired by this tradition on a regular basis at CTR.

The second manner of singing Psalms prevalent in the early Lutheran Church, which represented a marked departure from earlier practices, was the singing of free, metric Psalmic paraphrases in the form of congregational chorales. These Psalmic chorales, like much of the hymnody of the Reformation, were set in the vernacular and most often sung by the congregation unaccompanied and in unison. While Luther himself left several examples of congregational chorales based on the Psalms, many of which were referenced in last month's article, he also inspired his contemporaries to contribute to the genre as well. Spurred on by the encouragement and influence of Luther, many of his contemporaries and the younger composers of the following generation turned their attention to the Lutheran chorale and the words of the Psalter. Reformation-era composers such as Martin Agricola (1486-1556), Caspar Othmayr (1515-1553), and Hans Leo Hassler (1564-1612) wrote polyphonic choral settings of Psalmic chorales. These settings were typically not written as standalone choral works; instead, they most often served as alternatim stanzas to be sung by the choir in alternation with the assembly on congregational chorales. Still other Lutheran composers, such as Benedictus Ducis (c. 1492-1544) and Johann Walter (1496-1570), wrote original choral works based on Psalm texts in a manner not unlike Luther's *Non Moriar, Sed Vivam*.

In the twentieth and twenty-first centuries, the Lutheran Church has undergone a period of renewed interest in and emphasis on the revitalization of the historic liturgy of the Church. This renewal of liturgical practice was the impetus for an outpouring of Gebrauchsmusik, that is, musical compositions expressly written for use in the liturgy. Composers such as Hugo Distler (1908-1942) and Ernst Pepping (1901-1981) in Germany and Paul Manz (1919-2009) and Carl Schalk (1929-2021) in America wrote music for the Lutheran liturgy in a variety of genres and styles. Included in the output of these composers and many others were vernacular settings of the Psalms, some designed to include the congregation, some written for choir alone, but all constructed with the form of the Lutheran liturgy in mind. Likewise, numerous Lutheran hymn writers of the period, including Jaroslav Vajda (1919-2008), Herman Stuempfle (1923-2007), and Susan Palo Cherwien (1953-2021), have penned new congregational songs, many of which are inspired by or paraphrases of the Psalms. In the present day, psalmody in the Lutheran Church continues to be a living tradition, giving voice to the praise of God's people through songs of praise, thanksgiving, hope, lament, and supplication. Thanks be to God that "through the Church the song goes on!" (LSB 940, stanza 3).



When is it?

Early Registration Pay Schedule:


A \$175 non-refundable deposit per person is due by 10/15 or you may pay the full \$395.

A second payment of \$120 is due by December 31. A third and final payment of \$100 is due by March 1.

The full registration payment by CTR was made 11/1/24, all current registrants now owe a minimum of \$395.

Once you commit to going you are responsible for any costs associated with you going on the trip that the church pays in your name. If you decide at a later date to not go, you must find someone to take your place or you will be responsible for reimbursing Christ the Redeemer for any funds paid in your name above your registration fee. This includes: hotel costs, transportation costs, special event tickets, t-shirts, etc.
